So, it is more important than ever to assess your child's online activities periodically. Make sure you know which sites they are visiting, and who they are talking to on social media sites. Discuss risky behaviors with your children, like posting personal information (full name, age, location, school information, and more) using inappropriate language, or accessing sites with questionable content. Dear Parishioners...

This first Sunday of Lent, we usually hear the Gospel of the temptations of Jesus in the desert, related by the evangelist Mark, the shortest of the gospels. Mark begins his Gospel narrating the preaching of John the Baptist out in the desert: "The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God is near; convert yourselves and believe in the Good News" (Mk 1, 15).

We can respond to this invitation through two attitudes: conversion and faith. Conversion means taking another direction, changing course, not staying where you are and how you are, but striving to be what God wants us to be.

Faith is the positive side of conversion, openness. But it is, above all, the willingness to listen and trust the God of Jesus Christ.

The messianic condition of Jesus and his divine filiation do not deprive him of the trials and sufferings imposed by life itself. As a man, Jesus had to live trials and walk the hard path that leads to salvation, in the same way as the People of Israel.

Unlike Matthew and Luke, Mark does not mention what are those temptations of Jesus in the desert. Instead, he presents them throughout his Gospel, for Mark, the temptations occur throughout the entire life of Jesus. His life will be a constant struggle against all the temptations that will try to get Him out of his way.

The language of the tempter is always the same. "If you are the Son of God ...". A discourse that challenges God and will continue to exist as long as people say things like: "If God existed, why does he allow war... suffering... let my son/father/mother/die... why are their catastrophes, earthquakes...?"

Jesus teaches us to face these temptations through fasting, prayer, attentive listening to the word of God, penance, and almsgiving to the poor.

"Your ways, O Lord, are love and truth" - Psalm 25

Estimados feligreses...

Escuchamos este primer domingo de Cuaresma el evangelio de las tentaciones de Jesús en el desierto, relatadas por el evangelista Marcos, el más breve de los evangelios. Marcos comienza su Evangelio narrando la predicación de Juan el Bautista clamando en el desierto: "El tiempo se ha cumplido, y el Reino de Dios está cerca; convertíos y creed en la Buena Noticia" (Mc 1, 15).

Podemos responder a esta invitación mediante dos actitudes: conversión y fe.

Conversión significa tomar otra dirección, cambiar de rumbo, no quedarse donde se está y como se está, sino esforzarse en ser lo que Dios quiere que seamos.

La Fe es el lado positivo de la conversión, la apertura. Pero es, sobretodo la disposición a escuchar y a fíarse del Dios de Jesucristo.

La condición mesiánica de Jesús y su filiación divina no lo privan de la historia humana y tampoco de las pruebas y los sufrimientos impuestos por la vida misma. También Jesús, como hombre, tuvo que vivir las pruebas y recorrer el duro camino que conduce a la salvación, del mismo modo que el Pueblo de Israel.

Marcos, a diferencia de Mateo y Lucas, no señalan cuáles son esas pruebas de Jesús en el desierto; sino que las va presentando a lo largo de todo su evangelio, para Marcos las tentaciones suceden a lo largo de TODA la vida de Jesús. Su vida será una constante lucha contra todas las tentaciones que intentarán apartarlo de su camino.

El lenguaje del tentador siempre es el mismo. "si eres Hijo de Dios...". Un discurso que reta a Dios y que seguirá existiendo mientras la gente diga cosas como: Si Dios existiera, por qué permite la guerra... el sufrimiento... que muera mi hijo/padre/madre/....por qué hay catástrofes, terremotos...?

Jesús nos enseña a enfrentarnos a ese tipo de tentaciones mediante el ayuno, la oración y la escucha atenta a la palabra de Dios, la penitencia y la limosna a los pobres.

Why?

It is important to remember that the preparation of Lent is not simply meant to inculcate in the faithful faith-based ethics or self-improvement, but to prepare us for worship. The reception of ashes is not intended to be a sign of a vague, cultural association with the Catholic Church, but an external reminder that from the day of Ash Wednesday forward, you are preparing yourself for the awe-filled observances of Holy Week. Lent prepares us to let go of the superficiality and lack of attentiveness that can so often inhibit our appropriation of the Church's faith. Heightened attentiveness and intensified reflection concerning the startling culmination of Christ's Incarnation in suffering, death, and resurrection highlights that what is revealed to us in Christ are not merely ideas about God or feelings of a spiritual nature, but how God has chosen to relate to us in the most extraordinary, unexpected, and undeserved way. The Church asks us to accomplish three practices that are integral to our observance of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. ©WordonFire
